hat else is there to say about 2020? Every citizen in Logan County has been impacted in some way, a few tragically so. The agency suffered only minor absenteeism which was critical in allowing maintenance of the standards in most of the programs and performing our increased duties as a result of the pandemic. Disease tracing went up 10

fold from our usual 300 yearly, but grants for full-time contact tracers helped us with this time-consuming process. Grants, in fact, allowed us to pay employees for COVID work without having an adverse impact on our budget.

The Health District is proud to have been ahead of the curve in leading churches, restaurants, businesses, schools and others through the complexities of responding to the pandemic. In fact, some of those weekly meetings continued well into 2021. LCHD initiated a number of new ideas that were quickly taken up by other health districts, and even the Ohio Department of Health. The practical direction was science-based and resulted in the establishment of a new program for public health prevention in the field of indoor air quality. The agency began advising businesses and schools in June 2020, on adequate air exchange as a significant preventive to COVID spread. In response, many county schools and businesses improved their facility's air quality.



Top 5 reportable diseases for Logan County in 2020

91.3% - COVID-19

3.7% - Chlamydia

1.4% - Hepatitis C

1.2% - Influenza (hospitalized)

1% - Gonorrhea

It may appear that other disease cases in Logan County have decreased, but this is most likely due to the fact that people were fearful in seeking medical treatment during the major part of the pandemic.

Nursing Division

There are over 100 communicable and reportable diseases that are followed at the local level for the Ohio Department of Health. Logan County Health District **investigates** an average of **250-300 cases per year** and has seen an increase in the total number of cases over the past 5 years. **2020 saw nearly 3,000 cases** investigated due to the pandemic.

Women, Infants and Children

Participation in the WIC program continues to **increase** to help ensure **healthy families** in our community.

75% of WIC Moms who initiate breastfeeding continue to breastfeed after the first month.

WIC remained Open throughout the entire pandemic, serving families curbside. Their annual Baby Shower and Farmers' Market Program also continued in their outdoor venues.


