Letter from our Health Commissioner

As we reflect on 2022, one thing is clear: a global pandemic has put a spotlight on just how important public health is to a successful community. The Logan County Health District (LCHD) continued to change processes, update procedures, and shift resources throughout the year as community services continued through innovation, excellence, and integrity.

Many think of the LCHD as a place to receive vaccinations, birth certificates, or where people can receive low-cost health services. That's all true, but it's not the full picture. Much of the work is done outside the walls of the LCHD. That's because health is most influenced by what happens well before a doctor's visit. Health is impacted by where people live, learn, work, and play. LCHD team members are out in neighborhoods, on coalitions, and working together every day with partners to ensure there is safe food to eat and clean air to breathe in Logan County. Key focuses include monitoring for emerging public health threats, stopping disease outbreaks, implementing evidence-based prevention programs, and educating the community on a variety of topics from tobacco prevention to harm reduction to chronic disease.

Thousands of vaccinations provided an incredible amount of protection against dangerous variants of COVID-19 and other diseases such as influenza and measles. Hundreds of restaurant inspections ensure the food we eat is safe and won't make us sick. Hundreds of well and septic system permits were issued to ensure our water and natural environment is healthy.


This Annual Report explains ways the LCHD staff work every day to make Logan County a place where every person has the opportunity to be healthy.




